### Objects and activities of the charity

## The purposes of the charity as set out in its governing document.

The charity sets out to achieve its charitable objects through the objects given below.

The objects of the charity, as set out in its Memorandum of Association, are:

1. To relieve either generally or individually persons resident in Harrogate and the surrounding area who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress by the provision of furniture and other household accessories calculated to reduce the need, hardship or distress of such persons.

In addition, by agreement with the Charity Commission, the following object has been established:

2. To protect and preserve the environment for the benefit of the public, including (without limitation), the re-use and recycling of goods and their component parts and materials as a means of waste reduction.

The Board have reviewed these objectives following the implementation of the 2011 Charities Act and agreed that no changes were necessary.

### The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes during the year.

The trustees' policy is to offer all of our beneficiaries the chance to turn their house into a home, by the provision of as wide a choice of donated furniture and furnishings as is possible, all items being available at low cost. The charity is staffed by one full-time, and one part-time employee. We rely on the contribution of volunteers to collect, sort and deliver the furniture, and help with the office administration.

## The main activities undertaken during the year to further the charity's purpose for the public benefit.

In accordance with S17(5) of the Charities Act 2011, Trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit in planning our future activities. In particular the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the objects of the Charity.

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## Trustees' Annual Report for the year ended 31 March 2016

### The contribution of volunteers during the year.

The charity currently has a governing board of 7 trustees, all of whom are volunteers.

There are currently 19 volunteers who assist with the running of Essential Needs on a regular basis, both in the office and on the van. Office work, which involves the booking of collections and deliveries, the registration of new clients, stock control and the sale of furniture to clients. Van work involves the viewing and collection of furniture of donated goods and the delivery of goods to clients. Much of the work previously undertaken by the Project Manager has been carried out by volunteers during part of the year. Without this significant input from volunteers our costs would be greatly increased. Whilst detailed records are not kept, we estimate that around 350 hours of time per month are donated by volunteers which amounts to a value in the region of £30,000 if they had been paid the minimum wage

### The main achievements and performance of the charity during the year.

The most significant occurrence during the year, was the tragic illness of our manager, Martin Brassington, who sadly has died, subsequent to the end of the financial year.

The other staff and many volunteers have kept Essential Needs operating, but our ability to examine the wellbeing of the organisation have been significantly restricted during the latter part of the reporting period.

Nor has it been possible to develop new relationships with other charities and organisations in the area.

We have calculated that we sold 2816 items during the year, and estimate that 53,184kg of material were diverted from landfill as a result of our efforts, with a consequent saving on raw material use. We had over 5,135kgs of Domestic Electrical White Goods (WEEE) donated to us, this is a significant reduction from last year. 108 of these types of goods were re-used which was a significant decrease from last year.

We made 2071 visits across the district, to collect and deliver furniture and other household items.

We had 4,881 clients on our database at 31 March 2016, of which 265 were new clients.

We have around 120 agencies across the Harrogate District referring clients to us.

Over 208 people donated furniture using Gift Aid, emphasising the importance of this method of giving to us, although this is a reduction compared with the previous year.

The difference the charity's performance during the year has made to the beneficiaries of the charity and to the wider society.

Essential Needs contributes to Public benefit in the following ways:

Donors of goods to Essential needs are contributing to reducing landfill and helping the Local Authority to meet recycling targets. Recycling conserves energy, reduces air and water pollution, reduces greenhouse gases, and conserves natural resources. It also reduces the need for extracting, refining and processing raw materials.

Clients who receive low cost goods from Essential Needs are helped to improve their lives, their health and their well-being. These benefits result in a reduction in public resources and other social benefits.

Volunteers are all making their personal contribution to the above, so in summary, donors, clients and volunteers are all contributing to benefits which are valued by society as a whole.

### Structure, governance and management of the charity

## **Governing Document**

The Organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital, incorporated on 14 December 2004, and registered as a charity on 11 February 2005. The company (Registration Number 5312941) was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. On 31 March 2005 the company took over all of the activities, assets and liabilities of the former charity, Essential Needs (Registered Charity Number 1058202).

### The methods used to recruit and appoint new charity trustees.

New directors having skills appropriate to the activities of the charity are sought from members of the local community when vacancies arise. Potential directors are assessed for suitability by the office holders, and unless a director objects, invited to attend a meeting of the directors at which they may be appointed. Don McKenzie will be proposed as a new member of the Board at the 2016 AGM.

### **Financial review**

### The charity's financial position at the end of the year ended 31 March 2016

### Financial review of the position at the reporting date, 31 March 2016.

The board of trustees are satisfied with the performance of the charity during the year and the position at 31st March 2016 and consider that the charity is in a strong position to continue its activities during the coming year, and that the charity's assets are adequate to fulfil its obligations.

The Statement of Financial Activities shows gross incoming resources for the year of a revenue nature of £72,139 (Prior year - £97.540), with net incoming resources of a revenue nature, that is those funds used within the year on revenue activities, of £76,356 (prior year £69,027). The net incoming resources of a capital nature were £nil (Prior year £19,000).

The total reserves at the end of the year stand at £87,742 (prior year £91,959).

Free unrestricted liquid reserves, that exclude fixed assets purchased for the delivery of the Charity's aims, amounted to £69,793 (Prior year - £68,005).

Specific changes in fixed assets are detailed in the notes to the accounts.

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## Trustees' Annual Report for the year ended 31 March 2016

Before reviewing the figures for the year, it is important to understand the consequences of the absence of the project manager for a significant period of time. It was necessary to put in place emergency measures to enable day to day activities such as recording of income and expenditure onto the SAGE accounting system and dealing with the payment of accounts in a timely fashion. Whilst the help of all volunteers in this activity is hereby acknowledged, it was not practical to prepare management accounts on a regular basis. Over a period of time our ability to manage the process improved, and we are pleased to report that the hiring of a book keeper has enabled us to regain a position where we can be more confident of our financial situation.

The main assumption in the 2015/16 budget was to maintain core income at the level of the previous year. However, with the continuing uncertainty around, and changes to benefits, core income reduced by around 7%. Sales of furniture were £62,760 this year with overall unrestricted free income of £72,139

We were grateful to a variety of donors during the year. Principal in these were the Charles and Elsie Sykes trust, the Mangoletsi Foundation and the Harrogate Brigantes. These generous donations contributed towards our ongoing activities.

It was not possible to keep to our proposed budget, for the year, as additional salaries had to be paid to maintain our activities. However, despite this, when depreciation is excluded, expenditure at £70351 was held at some 7% higher than the previous year. Now we have a new van, expenditure on its maintenance shows a significant reduction, but many other items were similar to the previous year. The rent we pay for our warehouse was reviewed and we are faced with stepped increase in the amount we pay, a process which started in October 2015.

### Policies on reserves.

The Trustees have studied in detail the Charity Commission guidance on reserves and, as part of the management of risk, Essential Needs sets aside some of its income to form a reserve to cover any future shortfall in funding. Our income from furniture sales to fund ongoing activity cannot be guaranteed nor can the project funding that we receive for one off items of expenditure from various grant making organisations. The directors have considered the risks to income and believe that a reserve of 50% of annual budgeted expenditure would be adequate to enable the charity to review its operation should income significantly reduce. This would allow time to seek alternative sources of funding or look at alternative methods of operation as well as meet our obligations under the terms of the lease on our premises.

As at 31st March 2016 unrestricted funds, excluding fixed assets, were £87,744 and our bank balance was £63,210 enabling us to meet our obligations should they arise. Although this balance is above our target of 50% of expenditure, £35,000 this year, Trustees consider that maintaining a higher level this year will give us some flexibility with the further changes to client benefits in 2016, the stopping of the payment of reuse credits, an increase in the agreed rent and the significant uncertainty presented by the loss of the Project Manager. A balanced budget was therefore put forward for 2016/17. This level will be subject to ongoing review throughout the year.

### Availability and adequacy of assets of each of the funds

The board of trustees is satisfied that the charity's assets in each fund are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations in respect of each fund.

### Risks and uncertainties facing the charity.

During this financial year, the directors have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be provided so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

### Plans For the Future

# Summary of plans for the future and the trustees' perspective of the future direction of the charity.

Following the demise of the project manager it is the intention of the Board to appoint a new manager. This will provide the opportunity to review our activities. This will include the hours worked by our paid staff, our visibility in the Community and the consequence of changes to the benefit system and the impact on our clients. We will keep under review the entry requirements we set in an attempt to lower the barriers that needy people have to pass to access the warehouse. We continue to aim to contain our costs as far as possible and increase our income. Careful planning of jobs is used to reduce the mileage covered by the van and hence its running costs. More significantly, aiming to better utilise the van to respond as promptly as we are able to donors and clients should be of benefit to us.

We will seek to raise our profile whenever the opportunity arises to ensure anyone who meets our objectives knows about us, and that the donation of goods from donors continues, to allow us to meet the needs of our clients.

We will seek to work with other local organisations with similar objectives to ours for the mutual benefits of our clients.

The board reviews the on-going activities of Essential Needs against a background of changes to the laws governing recycling and re-use, and with changes in the policies of Local Authorities. Thus it is essential that we work in tandem with Harrogate Borough Council and North Yorkshire County Council to ensure the continued ability of the charity to meet the needs of our clients.

## Statement of Directors' and Trustees' Responsibilities

### Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Independent Examiner

### 1 Accounting policies

Policies relating to the production of the accounts.

### Basis of preparation and accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared on the accruals basis, under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities' (effective January 2015)) and 'The FRSSE Statement of Recommended Accounting Practice 2015', (The SORP 2015), and in accordance with all applicable law in the charity's jurisdiction of registration, except that the charity has prepared the financial statements in accordance with the FRSSE SORP 2015 in preference to the previous SORP, the SORP 2005, which has been withdrawn, notwithstanding the fact that the extant statutory regulations, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 refer explicitly to the SORP 2005. This has been done to accord with current best practice.

Policies relating to categories of income and income recognition.

Policies relating to expenditure on goods and services provided to the charity.

### Recognition of liabilities and expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for gross, and when incurred. Direct charitable expenditure includes the direct costs of the activities and depreciation on related assets. Where such costs relate to more than one functional cost category, they have been split on either an estimated time or floor space basis, as appropriate.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and staturtory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs liknked to the strategic management of the charity.

### Allocating costs to activities

Direct costs that are specifically related to an activity are allocated to that activity. Shared direct costs and support costs are apportioned between activities.

The basis for apportionment, which is consistently applied, and proportionate to the circumstances, is :-

Staffing - on the basis of time spent in connection with any particular activity.

Staffing - on a per capita basis, based on the number of of people employed within any partiular activity.

Premises related costs - on the proportion of floor area occupied by a particular activity.

**Non specific support costs** - on the basis of the usage of resources, in terms of time taken, capacity used, request made or other measures

Estimation techniques used in apportioning costs are done on a common sense basis.

### Volunteers

Charities often rely on the contribution of unpaid general volunteers in carrying out their activities. However, placing a monetary value on their contribution presents significant difficulties and make it impractical for their contribution to be measured reliably for accounting purposes. Given the absence of a reliable measurement basis, the contribution of general volunteers is not included as income in the charity accounts.

### Policies relating to assets, liabilities and provisions and other matters.

### Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are measured at their original cost value, or subsequent revaluation, or if donated, as described above. Cost value includes all costs expended in bringing the asset into its intended working condition.

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets to their anticipated residual value over their estimated useful lives.

Leasehold premises25% reducing balancePlant and machinery25% straight lineMotor vehicles25% reducing balance

#### **Debtors**

Debtors are measured at their recoverable amounts at the balance sheet date.

### Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are accounted for in accordance with normal accruals accounting conventions.

### Financial instruments including cash and bank balances

Cash held by the charity is included at the amount actually held and counted at the year end. Bank balances, whether in credit or overdrawn, are shown at the amounts properly reconciled to the bank statements.

### Leasing and hire purchase contracts and commitments

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged in the profit and loss account on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

### Pensions - defined contribution schemes

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the profit and loss account as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

### 2 Liability to taxation

As a registered charity, the organisation is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applied towards the charitable objects of the charity and for no other purpose. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the charity, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

### 3 Winding up or dissolution of the charity

If upon winding up or dissolution of the charity there remain any assets, after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities, the assets represented by the accumulated fund shall be transferred to some other charitable body or bodies having similar objects to the charity.
